







Step back into the past 100 years

It went on to become one of the largest e-health services in the world.</p> <p>It was later replaced by NHS Choices and the 111 service.</p>	<p>2007: Robotic arm is used in groundbreaking heart operations Doctors control the robot arm through a computer using a joystick. In future, it might be possible to program the robot arm to target a place in the heart chosen by the doctor.</p>	<p>2012: NHS is celebrated at the London 2012 Olympic Games</p> <p>2017: There are over 350 different jobs in the NHS.
